Rare Species Conservatory Foundation Receives \$25,000 Grant from the David R. Morris Fund to Support Global Wildlife Conservation Efforts

Loxahatchee, FL — The Rare Species Conservatory Foundation (RSCF) is proud to announce it has been awarded a **\$25,000 grant from the David R. Morris Fund** to advance its global conservation programs dedicated to protecting endangered wildlife and their habitats.

The grant will directly support RSCF's field-based initiatives around the world, including efforts to **restore critically endangered mountain bongo antelope in Kenya, protect endangered parrots and primates in South America and the Caribbean, and combat illegal wildlife trade.**

"We are deeply honored by this generous support from the David R. Morris Fund," said **Dr. Paul Reillo**, RSCF's founder and president. "This investment helps us continue the science-driven, hands-on work that has always defined RSCF — saving species from extinction and rebuilding the ecosystems they anchor."

Founded in 1995, RSCF has earned international recognition for its success in protecting keystone and flagship species through habitat protection, reintroduction programs, and conservation breeding. The organization also partners with local communities, governments, and other NGOs to create sustainable solutions that benefit both people and wildlife.

"This grant comes at a critical time," added Reillo. "With so many species facing unprecedented threats, collaboration and strategic investment are key. The David R. Morris Fund's commitment allows us to scale up our impact where it's needed most."

For nearly three decades, RSCF has demonstrated that saving species can save entire ecosystems, proving that conservation is not just about protecting wildlife but about ensuring a healthier planet for all.
